Let me tell you about Shirley, an Interfaith Caregivers' client, and Laura, one of our amazing volunteers. Two strangers who formed an inseparable bond after being brought together by Interfaith.

It began shortly around Shirley's 95th birthday when she promised her family that she

would give up her car. However, just the thought of not being able to drive herself left Shirley feeling overwhelmed. How would she manage trips to the grocery store, doctor, dentist, and hair salon? How would she stay connected with her friends? Would she still be able to play piano and organ at church? <u>She was worried!</u>

Determined not to give up her independence, Shirley remembered that Interfaith had once helped her by providing a volunteer to stay with her late husband when

she needed time away. Encouraged by her family, she reached back out to Interfaith to see how we could help. Soon after, Shirley began scheduling regular rides.

On one of her first rides, she met Laura, a fairly new Interfaith Caregivers' volunteer. During their time together, they discovered many shared interests. They both loved puzzles, crafts and music, and they had both grown up out of state. Laura also found out that Shirley learned to drive on a Model A and had been a piano teacher for 30 years! Their relationship really took off!

Now, they are more like mother and daughter than volunteer and client. Shirley says, *"It seems like I've always known you."* And Laura feels the same saying *"You've been a blessing to me."* Today, you can find them stopping for ice cream, grabbing a sandwich, sorting through yarn together, or working on a puzzle after running errands.

Thinking back to that first ride, Shirley says "[It's] all because of Interfaith. I would never have met Laura if it wasn't for them."
